TOPIC: "Bread and Butter Diagnosis"

Dr. Eleazer is chairman of the Department of Endodontics, program director of the post-graduate endodontic residency program, and an implantology resident at the University of Alabama School of Dentistry. He came to Birmingham in 2001 from the University of Louisville where he headed the residency program in endodontics and chaired the Department of Periodontics, Endodontics and Dental Hygiene. Prior to that, he taught at the Medical College of Virginia and practiced in Albany, Georgia. He received his D.D.S. from the University of North Carolina in 1970 and a certificate in endodontics and a master's in oral biology from Temple University. His talk will cover everyday tips for solving difficult diagnostic problems and preventing problems before they happen. He will present actual clinical cases and reading radiographs and anticipating what you might find inside the tooth based on radiographic subtleties. He will also discuss pain and the weight that should be assigned to various pulp tests. His talk will also cover infections of the head and neck.

Dear Colleagues,

This month, a long-time patient of mine told my receptionist that she could not come in for her prophylaxis appointment since she had lost her job, a job she had held for over a decade. It made me think of my brother-in-law Dr. Donald Baugh. I remember talking to Don once during a particularly bad time in the economy for the steel mills in Birmingham. Don told me of the despair many of his patients were facing in the time of rising unemployment for the steel workers. He told me of a man who had told him he could not pay for the dental care of his children when he was laid off from the steel mills. Don, without hesitation, told him to bring his children in. He told me that the man had been a faithful patient during the good times, and that he felt the obligation to provide their dental care during the bad times. He knew that when their situation improved the father would return as a patient with gratitude for the care Don had given his family.

Henry Brook Adams once said: "A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops." Don died in 2005, yet I still hear his advice on this and many other issues pertaining to life and our responsibilities as dentists. I encourage each of you to listen carefully for that cry for help from your patients. When one loses his or her job, there is a profound doubt introduced into his or her life. Family providers, who once had no thought of how tenuous their economic position was, are being faced with pressures that few of us have to face. If my schedule is an example, we have openings available during our days to help someone who could use a little lift in their lives. I do it to honor Don's memory and the struggle of good men and women who are facing a challenging time in their lives.

Each of us has had truly motivational teachers like Don Baugh in our careers. There's not one of us who can claim to be a self-made man or woman. We are where we are today because we stand on the shoulders of our predecessors, our mentors and teachers who have given us a profession that is greatly respected by our fellow man. We have been given this profession to hold for a brief time and pass to the next generation. Let's vow that the profession we pass along is stronger because of the effort and care we put back into it and because of the level of care we provide for our patients.

I can't think about Christmas with the Baughs without remembering how much Don loved to be around his family. He had a nickname for each of us, and he really enjoyed being surrounded by his family and friends. I hope each of you and your loved ones have a wonderful holiday season with lasting memories of good times together. I am proud to be your colleague.

Our United Way liaison Meredith Watkins says we hope to wrap things up by Dec. 1. If you have not sent in your pledge, please do.


Or if you are one of the ones who pledged a cumulative \$18,000 last year and have not renewed, please renew. We have a reputation for going over the top the last few years.

JANUARY SEMINAR AND THEN SOME! When first you flip over to that pristine 2010 calendar, put a big circle around January 15th. On that day at Hoover Country Club, we'll have a six-hour seminar for our dentists and a four-hour seminar for hygienists. The dentists' program will feature Dr. John Burgess of the University of Alabama School of Dentistry and will be underwritten by Dentsply Caulk. The hygiene program will feature Brenda Sharp McCarson, R.D.H, B.S. and will be sponsored by Brasseler. Everything will get underway at 8:30 a.m. with a continental breakfast.

Dr. Burgess is assistant dean for Clinical Research and director of Biomaterials at the University of Alabama School of Dentistry. He joined the faculty in 2007 after Hurricane Katrina. Recently, he and eight students had 17 papers accepted at the International Association for Dental Research in Washington, D.C. He was formerly professor and chairman of Operative Dentistry and Biomaterials as well as assistant dean for Clinical Research at Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center—School of Dentistry. He has published more than 300 articles, abstracts and textbook chapters and presented more than 800 continuing education courses.

"The Adhesive Restoration" will be his topic, and it will include segments on bonding agents, ceramics, cements and a composite resin update.

Your fee, which includes a buffet brunch will be \$125.

Dental Hygienists can expect a program on Advanced Instrumentation and Mastering the Piezoelectric Ultrasonic Scaling Device from Ms. McCarson, whose thirty years as a licensed dental hygienist includes experience in the dental and medical sales industry, public health dentistry, education and clinical practice in general and periodontal practices. A graduate of Greenville Technical College, she holds an AS in Dental Phygiene and a B.S. in Health Science from the Medical University of South Carolina.—She is currently a product specialist for Brasseler USA's Dental Hygiene and Surgical Segments.

Her program will include an overview of the different classifications of dental hygiene treatment instruments, a review of the root morphology that complicates dental hygiene instrumentation, evaluations of hand-instrument opportunities beyond the SH6/H7 and S204S, and an introduction to the design, function and use of popular advanced instrumentation. In the Scaling portion of the program, attendees will have an opportunity to practice the correct technique in a clinical setting with extracted teeth. They will learn to distinguish between the two categories of power scalers and understand the mechanism of action and stroke pattern for sonic, piezo and magnetostrictive power scalers.
