TOPIC: "Concepts of Complete Dentistry - Occlusion...it can make you or break you"

Dr. Wilkerson is the Director of Dental Medicine and a senior lecturer at the Dawson Academy. He lectures extensively nationally and internationally on the subjects of restorative dentistry, occlusion and masticatory disorders. He is president of the American Equilibration Society. He joined the Dawson group practice in St. Petersburg, Florida after graduating from the University of Florida College of Dentistry in 1982. His timely presentation will review mouths that have broken down and cases that have failed due to occlusion problems, including the failure to adhere to critical principles of occlusion. ### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

### A Valuable Opportunity - Not To Be Missed

What occlusal philosophy do you follow? Pankey? Dawson? Gnathology? Or do you feel, as Frank Spear does, that each philosophy works, but on different patients? And, how do you handle the worn dentition when it presents in your office? What system do; you use to make decisions about how to restore these cases with the best long-term prognosis? Or do you, as John Kois, base your decisions on long-term risk assessments? According to Kois, if a patient has a history of uncontrolled periodontal disease and continues to lose bone around teeth, implants may be at long-term risk and, therefore, not the treatment of choice. On the other hand, if a patient has a history of caries, then bridges may be at long-term risk, and the treatment of choice may be implants.

We leave dental school with a base of education to make safe decisions, but, as the saying goes,"If we are not growing, we are dying." Learning how to place a restoration technically is necessary, but even more valuable is understanding the theories behind them. Take the worn dentition case. If the attrition is due to severe GERD (gastric reflux), then the case can very predictably be restored, and the patient should expect a good long-term prognosis. Attrition due to a neurophysiologic habit in which the patient grinds solely in retrusive will look much different than attrition due to a habit in which the patient grinds end to end or has anterior pathway wear. This will impact whether the VDO will need to be increased or not.



### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (cont'd)

Once we graduate from dental school, the best learning we can receive often comes from being involved in study clubs in which people who work together also learn together. When comprehensive treatment planning together, we can find out what all is possible and collectively decide the best treatment for the patient. For instance, who could best create or restore a papilla which is not optimally esthetic? The periodontist? The orthodontist? Or the restorative dentist? Many studies show that surgically grafting papillae is not very predictable even in the most capable hands. Dennis Tarow has shown us that if there is less than 5 mm from the contact point between teeth to the crestal bone, then we can predictable get a papilla even if one was not fully present before. This may involve an orthodontic correction to upright roots and change the contact or it may best be corrected with a restoration.

When faced with treatment planning challenges, we all pull arrows from our quiver. The more arrows we have to draw from, the more likely we are to hit the target – a predictable esthetic outcome. We gain arrows with school, experience, networking, study clubs and great lectures. October 1, we will have the opportunity to learn from one of the greats, Dr. DeWitt Wilkerson from the Dawson Institute. Courses at the Dawson Institute cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000 plus travel. We have an opportunity to hear six hours for less than \$300 and without the travel. I look forward to seeing you there.
